# ADA Settlement Agreement with DeCamp Bus Lines (New Jersey) -

The Justice Department announced that it has reached a settlement agreement with DeCamp Bus Lines to ensure that bus transportation is provided on equal terms to people with disabilities. They violated the Americans with Disabilities Act by requiring that passengers with disabilities provide 48 hours of advance notice to secure a wheelchair accessible bus. The agreement requires DeCamp to comply with all ADA requirements for accessible service and not exclude persons with disabilities from its transportation services. <u>Special Education Could Face \$2 billion in Cuts</u> – Preliminary figures from the U.S. House of Representatives Committee on Appropriations indicate that education programs (IDEA) could be slashed by nearly 20 percent for the fiscal year beginning October 1, partly as a result of the sequester, the spending cuts that took effect in March.

#### **Access Board Forms Advisory Committee on Rail Vehicle**

Accessibility - The U.S. Access Board has organized an advisory committee as part of its review and update of the ADA Accessibility Guidelines for Transportation Vehicles. The Rail Vehicles Access Advisory Committee will develop consensus recommendations for the Board's use in updating sections of the guidelines that cover vehicles of fixed guide way systems, including rapid, light, commuter, intercity, and high speed rail. These guidelines, which were originally published in 1991, serve as the basis for standards that apply to new or remanufactured vehicles required to be accessible under the ADA. The committee's work will not extend to portions of the guidelines that address buses and vans, which the Board is already in the process of updating. Source: www.access-board.gov

# Governor Rick Scott Signs 36 Bills into Law

Florida's Medicaid Leaves Out Many — Florida's program covers few adults other than the disabled. Florida Medicaid covers parents of children on Medicaid only if their incomes are 20% of the poverty level or below — under \$4,000 for a family of three. Childless adults are not covered at all. Adults who have an income below the poverty level will not qualify for the Affordable Care Act's online marketplace where insurance will be subsidized on a sliding scale. At that point LYNX services (fixed route, LYMMO, NeighborLink and Road Rangers) will be pulled off the road for safety reasons.

The period beginning 12 hours before sustained winds are expected to reach 35 mph, ACCESS LYNX will ONLY be providing life sustaining medical trips.

<u>Tech Giant to Recruit Workers with Autism</u>—The Germany based software giant SAP will recruit individuals with developmental disorders for jobs as software testers, programmers and data quality assurance specialists. SAP conducted a pilot program in India with six workers on the spectrum employed as software tests which resulted in improved productivity. Another pilot is underway in Ireland and plans are in the works for the employment effort to expand to the United States, Canada and Germany this year. www.disabilityscoop.com

<u>Dumbing Us Down</u> – Smartphones allow us to listen to music, check our e-mail, browse the internet and track our daily calorie intake, but new research out of the University of Texas at Dallas says multi-tasking rewires the brain, robs us of frontal lobe brainpower and reduces our ability to make good decisions.

Better think twice before that walk in the city — A walk down a busy city sidewalk by individuals showed worse memory, poor attention, and learning problems. So why does walking in the city make us dumber? In a large scale study by the University of Michigan found that people who walk through the city had worse memory, poor attention and learning patterns. The reason: stress. Stressful situations can reduce the number of connections between neurons in the brain and can impair your ability to manage stressful events. On the brighter side, behavioral therapy such as meditation or yoga can help repair the damage. Source: www.living.msn.com

Alternative Therapies for High Blood Pressure – A study from the American Heart Association says alternative approaches to lowering blood pressure, such as isometric hand grip exercise and resistance or strength training are effective at reducing high blood pressure. While all three types of therapies reduced blood pressure, certain ones were more effective than others. Isometric hand grip exercises were able to lower systolic and diastolic blood pressure by 10% after four weeks of doing the exercises, walking programs and device guided slow breathing resulted in smaller drops in blood pressure. <u>Say What Again! The Invisible Hearing Aid</u> – Hearing loss is the third most common physical condition after heart disease and arthritis. The hearing device uses the eardrum and native hearing bones to sense sound energy. The energy is sent to the inner ear for interpretation, creating a clearer natural sound. The patient can wear it in the shower, throughout the night and wear it in the swimming pool. Cost is not cheap – about \$35,000 per ear and is not covered by insurance.
