WHEREAS, it is in the interest of the State of New Jersey to encourage the full participation of Americans with multi-sensory disabilities in our economy by fostering the employment of, and promoting housing and recreational options for, people who are Deaf-Blind, all of which maximize their opportunities for an empowered, productive life in the community of their choice; and

WHEREAS, today, people who are Deaf-Blind are attending college, participating in social activities, managing their everyday lives and actively engaging in their communities through employment, civic and recreational activities; and

WHEREAS, the above-named organizations support this effort and offer a continued commitment to expanded, inclusionary opportunities for those who are Deaf-Blind; and

WHEREAS, it is highly appropriate and necessary to publicize the abilities and potential of our fellow citizens who are Deaf-Blind, or severely vision and hearing-impaired, and to recognize Helen Keller as a guiding example of courage, hope, determination, ability and achievement for other individuals who are Deaf-Blind, as well as the larger community;
