New NLS Director- Mr. Jason Broughton has been appointed Director, National Library Service for the Blind and Print Disabled (NLS), Library of Congress.

Mr. Broughton is the 11th Director and the first African American to serve in this capacity since the inception of the program on March 3,1931. Prior to joining NLS, Mr. Broughton held leadership positions in South Carolina, Savannah, Georgia; and recently served as Vermont State Librarian.

Mr. Broughton holds several degrees including an M.S. in Library and Information Science, an M.S. in Public Administration and a bachelor's degree in Biology.

NLS Anniversary- The year 2021 marks the 90th anniversary of the Pratt-Smoot Act which prompted the establishment of the National Library Service for the Blind and Print Disabled. FOCUS ON OUR PATRONS: JUDY A.

Judy has been a member of our Talking Book program since 2017. When asked about the program, Judy said, "I love it! It is terrific! It is the very best thing!" Judy grew up in rural Pennsylvania near the town of Saint Mary's. She recalls a lovely childhood, with a family of three brothers and one sister. Their house was situated on a mountaintop with panoramic views, and their nearest neighbor was a mile away. Elk would routinely come into their yard to eat apples from the trees, leaving a few less for her mother's apple pies. During her first year of college, Judy passed the Civil Service Exam and received a job offer from the Office of Personnel Management, Federal Investigations Program in Washington, D.C. She seized the opportunity and moved to the city. She loved her job and worked there for 28 years. She later worked for the National Children's Center and American Vets.

When asked how she is currently doing, and how she is dealing with the pandemic, Judy said "If the weather is good, sometimes I will go out for a walk, three days a week." Trips to the grocery store and the local park are also helpful to break up the monotony of quarantine. Fellow church members have been very supportive; paying her visits, bringing household supplies, and sending thoughtful cards.

Judy recently reviewed her list of favorite authors and was surprised to discover that her top two authors, Stuart Woods

(Stone Barrington series) and Fern Michaels, had lost their position to someone else. With true astonishment, Judy questioned, "What? How did that happen? How did she get in there? She is not supposed to be in there!" Anne George and her "Southern Sisters" mystery series now holds the top honor. Of the series, Judy says, "They are funny stories, laugh out loud, family stories. They are mysteries. Nothing that puts you on the edge of your seat and scares you. Nothing real tense." Another discovery that she finds very funny is James Herriot's semi-autobiographical "All Creatures Great and Small" series, which chronicles the adventures of a veterinarian in the English countryside. She loves David Rosenfelt's Andy Carpenter mystery series. She thinks they are well crafted stories, with lots of humor, and reveal the author's love of dogs. She intends to write Mr. Rosenfelt and encourage him to write faster. Other Judy favorites include Lee Child's Jack Reacher series, Jan Karon's Mitford series, and the Donald Bain/Jessica Fletcher "Murder She Wrote" series.

We would like to thank Judy for sharing her time and telling her story, the depth and breadth of which extend well beyond the confines of this article. It shows that the Talking Book program is truly made great by our patrons and their stories.

Jennifer's Salad Pizza -

If you are ready to "think green," this pizza is for you! Lots of green vegetables layered on top of pizza dough reminds me of growing up in Pennsylvania where French fries are put on top of sandwiches and salads.

Ingredients:

Your favorite store-bought pizza dough. (Pre-made, refrigerated pizza dough can be found in most grocery stores)

1 TBS extra-virgin olive oil

½ cup shredded mozzarella cheese and provolone cheese

2 cloves of chopped garlic

1/4 tsp oregano

½ small red onion, thinly sliced

4 cups baby spinach

½ cup chopped roasted red peppers

3/4 cup quartered marinated artichoke hearts, drained, and halved

1 TBS red wine vinegar

Salt, pepper, & red pepper flakes

Directions:

Preheat oven according to the store-bought pizza dough instructions or 475 degrees Fahrenheit. Stretch out the dough on parchment paper. Transfer to a baking sheet or pizza stone and bake for 10 minutes.

Top pizza dough with cheese and garlic and bake for 2 minutes or until the cheese has melted.

Make the salad by soaking red onion in vinegar and olive oil. Toss the spinach, roasted red peppers, artichoke hearts and

red onion in a large bowl with vinegar and olive oil, season with salt and pepper.

Top the pizza with the salad and enjoy!

Technology Corner

Magnification Feature on Mobile Devices-

The magnifier accessibility feature on the iPhone and iPad allows you to use the device's camera as a magnifying glass. To use the magnifier in your Apple device, go to the Accessibility menu in your device settings, select "Magnifier", and toggle the button next to Magnifier to turn it on. This will allow you to reach the magnifier quickly on your device. Click the "Home" button three times to access the magnifier.

You can adjust brightness and contrast while using the magnifier, invert colors, and use the device's flashlight. The iOS 14 has new additional features that makes the magnifier controls easier to access. Another new feature is the multishot option. This allows you to take multiple photos or screenshots at a time and then review the screenshots together instead of individually.

If you have an Android device or would like a separate magnification application on your phone and tablet, check your device's app store for free magnifiers. One popular app is Magnifying Glass + Flashlight, which allows for magnification while using your device's flashlight and helps you read small fonts such as those found on prescription bottles and restaurant menus. You can also take photos of what you are magnifying and save them in your photo library to view later.

The former first daughter and co-author of *Sisters First (DB 89560)* shares personal anecdotes about both sets of

grandparents, including George and Barbara Bush, through a series of essays. She discusses the lessons all four individuals taught her and looks to the future and the lessons she hopes to teach her own children. Unrated. Commercial audiobook. Nonfiction. Bestseller. 2020.

How to lead: wisdom from the world's greatest CEOs, founders, and game changers by David M. Rubenstein (DB 100664)

Author of *The American Story (DB 97695)* presents a collection of interviews with leading businesspeople, innovators, politicians, athletes, entertainers, and nonprofit leaders about what makes them successful in their chosen professions. Individuals interviewed include Oprah Winfrey, Yo-Yo Ma, Jack Nicklaus, Renee Fleming, and Warren Buffett. Nonfiction. 2020.

They wish they were us by Jessica Goodman (DB 100505) At an exclusive prep school on Long Island, Jill eagerly anticipates her role in the school's most elite clique, the Players, until new evidence surfaces about the murder of a classmate. Young Adult Fiction. Strong language, some violence, and some explicit descriptions of sex. For senior high and older readers. 2020.

Thick as thieves by Sandra Brown (DB 100485)

Twenty years ago, four individuals almost pulled off a half-million-dollar heist. But by daybreak, their plan had been shot to hell. One of them was in the hospital, one in jail, and one dead. However, one got away—presumably with the money. The now-grown daughter of that man decides to investigate.

The Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) 31st Anniversary -

The year 2021 marks the 31st anniversary of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA). Passed into law by President George H.W. Bush on July 26, 1990, the ADA is a civil rights law that prohibits discrimination based on disability. It is modeled after the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and section 504 of the 1973 Rehabilitation Act.
