Joseph Lovett has glaucoma, a disease that robs 4.5 million people worldwide of their vision. After years of slowly losing his sight, Joe decided to take action: to investigate how people all over the country respond to vision-loss. The film is a record of his search. It begins small, with people Joe meets on the streets of his hometown New York City and gradually leads him to places and people around the country, of all different ages and backgrounds. Each has a fascinating story about dealing with the vision loss caused by sight-robbing diseases, infections and accidents.

An infection robbed Lauren of her sight in 2009. Today she still has no central vision, meaning she can't see objects directly in front of her, and no peripheral vision either. She can't make out people's faces, has trouble with street signs — but still manages to work a demanding job at JPMC, assisted by multiple over-size monitors and other accommodations.
